Khosrow Adeli is currently Head, Division of Clinical Biochemistry, Dept. of Laboratory Medicine, the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, Ontario. Dr. Adeli has been an active reviewer for several international journals including: Journal of Biological Chemistry, Biochemistry, European Journal of Biochemistry, Endocrinology, Diabetes, Biochemistry and Cell Biology, Journal of Lipid Research, Arteriosclerosis Thrombosis Vascular Biology, American Journal of Pathology, Clinical Chemistry and Clinical Biochemistry. From July 1999 to December 2005, Khosrow served the CSCC as editor in chief of Clinical Biochemistry.

Khosrow is an outstanding record in research at the University of Windsor and at the University of Toronto. He continues to receive external funding as a principal investigator (and coinvestigator) and was the recipient of the CSCC Research Excellence Award in 1999.

Khosrow has been Director, Postdoctoral Training Program in Clinical Chemistry, Department of Laboratory Medicine and Pathobiology, University of Toronto since 2000. He has had several graduate students at University of Windsor and at University of Toronto.
